

MLA Citation Style for Web Pages

The citations of a **Works Cited** page should be double-spaced with *hanging indents*. (The first line of each citation is at the left margin. All subsequent lines are indented one-half inch from the left margin.) To create hanging indents, consult the Help feature of your word processing program. The Tab key may also be used. In most word processing programs, it is pre-set to indent the required one-half inch.

➤ **Web pages**

Needed information - Author's last name, first name. "Title of the Web Page." Title of the Website. Day Month Year page was created/last updated. Name of Institution/Organization sponsoring the site, if different from title of website. Day Month Year of Access <URL>.

➤ **An Entire Website**

Needed information - Title of the Site. Name of the Editor of the Site, if given. Day Month Year the site was created/last updated. Name of Institution/Organization sponsoring the site. Day Month Year of Access <URL>.

➤ **Web pages with multiple authors** (Use these formats to replace single author names in the above examples.)

Two authors - Rogers, Mary, and Catherine King.

Three authors - Edwards, Clive, Laura Nadar, and Paul Brown.

More than three authors - Pares, Susan, et al.
